## Ideas for Book Battle Teams

| Choosing the Team | Create a Google form with a question from each book as well as some questions about why students want to be on the team. | Example here: <br> https://forms.gle/KDDwp99A952iFYHQ8 |
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| Team Practice | May happen during the school day or after school. 1-2 times a week is usually sufficient. |  |
| Covering the Books | Encourage students to keep notes in a journal and to give book talks to the team after they finish one. <br> - Students can also write their own questions for the books for team practice- things to notice include chapter titles, character names, settings, interesting quotes, strange/unique facts. |  |
| Practices | - Play a matching game with the title, author, and main characters/settings. <br> - Give teams copies of the book covers. Ask them practice questions and allow them to use the book covers to answer. <br> - Read aloud quotes from each book and have students guess the book and discuss the quote/book. <br> - Print the book covers. Give one to each student or place at desks around the room. Each student has 1 minute to write as many details as they can about the book. After a minute, rotate and try to come up with new details each time. <br> - Print a picture from the book with characters in it. Add some thought/dialogue bubbles. Let students fill in things the characters would think or say in situations. <br> - Play Trashketball- ask questions, students write answers on paper, correct answers get to "shoot" the paper into the trashcan for extra points. |  |
